Following club business member presented on their Alternative Collections.

Chuck discussed the various knives he collects and focused on the military items. Tow pointes he brought up were damage that can be done to horn handles on knives by <u>carpet beetles</u> and not storing knives in leather sheaths due to <u>damage</u> from acids and moisture.

Other members talked about collecting <u>vintage soda</u> <u>bottle</u> and cans. Glass soda bottles were produced from the 1800s to the 1970s (at which time bottles gave way to aluminum cans). Glass bottles debuted in the 1840s and were originally capped with porcelain corks encased in wire. Though handsome, the FDA outlawed them in 1906 due to sanitary concerns. That short shelf life helps them net more than \$500 each. Vintage

versions of the more readily available crown-top variety average \$10, with noteworthy examples such as rare brands or anniversary editions averaging \$30
