

Unintentional/Natural Damage:

-Natural Wear – Caused by friction from being carried in pockets or by abrasive contact with other coins.



-Corrosion/Pitting – caused by being buried or sitting in moist conditions for prolonged periods of time.



-Bent Coins – self-explanatory -Rim Damage



-Scratches - self-explanatory



Intentionally Defaced/Damaged Coinage:

-Holed Coins -

Oftentimes older coins will have holes drilled or pushed through them. This, in many cases, was to allow the owner to keep them on a string or thin rope or to tie them into clothing or a bag to prevent the money from being lost or stolen.



*Whereas, in the case of many Large Cents, it was often seen as good luck to nail a penny near the entry-way of one's home.

-"Hash marks" (Possibly Misinformed on this?)

Sometimes used to mark a coin as being received as payment or distinguish it from other funds. And also sometimes just graffiti done out of sheer boredom.

*In some very old coins (Pre-1800) minor hash marks may be present on Mint-state coins as these marks were added to the dies for alignment purposes.

-Art/Exnumia

1) Love Tokens – these occur in many different denominations, though most frequently on dimes and quarters and other silver coins.



2) Counter-stamping / Countermarks - most often done to convert coin-change into Tokens as a form of advertisement for businesses or campaigns for political office.



-Cleaning

1) **Polished / Whizzed** – When the original surface of a coin is removed using abrasive materials or metal polish.




2) Wiped / Dipped – When an acid or corrosive substance is used to chemically treat the surface of a coin in an attempt to remove undesirable/unwanted oxidation or corrosion.



Though in older times, these countermarks (Punch-marks / Chop-marks) would have also been used by colonies or foreign countries to mark another (more established) country's currency as being legal tender for trade in that foreign region.



3) Jewelry – Many different forms of jewelry have been made using coins.
 a) Silhouetting – a form of jewelry where the background of the coin is removed, only leaving the portraiture and rim of the coin. Typically used for necklaces.



b) Bezeled Coins - either held in a bezel by tension or welded to it. Typically used for necklaces.



c) Encased Coins – Typically cents, which have been pressed in a piece of aluminum or brass which has a pre-stamped/molded design on it.

First examples known are from the Pan American Exposition of 1901 in Buffalo NY. Later examples in the early 20th century come from some of the World's Fairs and other major Expositions. Though later in the Teens and 20's, some banks and various businesses began creating their own encased coins for use as advertisement, while certain politicians even began using them as campaign tokens.



d) Hobo Nickels / Carved coins – Coins that have had the details of the obverse or reverse side carved-out further to create a new image.
